

DRINKING WATER ADVISORY: Pennsylvania American Water Issues Boil Water Advisory for Customers in Parts of Scranton

SCRANTON, Pa. (July 19, 2026) – Pennsylvania American Water today issued a boil water advisory for customers in parts of Scranton due to a water main break near the intersection of North Washington Avenue and Mulberry Street. Repairs are currently underway and anticipated to take approximately 12 hours to complete. Approximately 620 customers are impacted.

Pennsylvania American Water experienced a loss in positive water pressure on Sunday, July 19, due to a water main break. A loss of positive water pressure is a signal of the existence of conditions that could allow contamination to enter the distribution system through backflow by back-pressure or back-siphonage. As a result, there is an increased chance that the water might contain disease-causing organisms.

DO NOT DRINK THE WATER WITHOUT BOILING IT FIRST. Bring all water to a rolling boil, let it boil for one minute, and cool before using; or use bottled water. Use boiled or bottled water for drinking, making ice, washing dishes, brushing teeth and food preparation until further notice.

Inadequately treated water may contain disease-causing organisms. These organisms include bacteria, viruses and parasites, which can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea and associated headaches.

These symptoms are not caused only by organisms in drinking water, but also by other factors. If you experience any of these symptoms and they persist, you may wish to consult with your health care provider. People with severely compromised immune systems, infants and some elderly may be at increased risk. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers.

What happened? What is being done?

Pennsylvania American Water is currently making repairs to the broken water main. Repairs are estimated to take approximately 12 hours to complete. Once service is restored, Pennsylvania American Water will collect and analyze additional water quality samples including bacteria samples.

We will inform you when the corrective actions have been completed and you no longer need to boil your water.
